WANTED


Memory keeper. A tireless leader and project manager willing to make daily sacrifices. Staff is limited to two years of experience. Must be able to motivate and mentor peers, hold others accountable, re-produce weeks of work on a moment's notice and make difficult decisions. Impeccable design, writing, editing and collaboration skills are essential. Ability to predict the future is helpful.

Note: In 2020 and 2021, expect frequent disruptions with the team and staff relocation to a virtual environment. Individual and large group photos will still be required while following public health recommendations for social distancing.

Deliverable: This one-year commitment produces a permanent, printed archive documenting the high school experience. Deadlines and subject matter are pre-determined and non-negotiable. Content must be creative, engaging, well-rounded, error-free and should not duplicate earlier productions.

Time Commitment: Role requires long hours, late nights, and numerous evenings and weekends.

Compensation: This is an unpaid position. The reward is a job well done, knowing the work captures the year in a way people will remember for the rest of their lives. Pizza is occasionally provided.




Historical Snapshot: President Donald Trump named TIME Magazine's 2016




